


READ BEFORE ASSEMBLING:

- Go through the instructions one step at a time.
 Don't punch out all of the precut parts at once.
 Plywood thickness and color may vary.
 While not necessary, glue may be applied if desired.
 If you have trouble punching out the small pieces from the board, use tweezers or a toothpick to help.
 Adult supervision recommended.

MAKE IT YOUR OWN

Before you start building and decorating your model, make a plan. Do you want to make an exact replica of the project below or create something of your own design? Anything goes!

PLAN

For this project, assemble the model before you paint. To reach all the areas of the model, use a variety or paintbrush sizes. If you need to, it's okay to pull a piece off, paint it, and then put it

TECHNIQUE

To give your model more depth, use darker shades of paint for shadows and lighter shades for the highlights.

PROCESS

Start by painting all of the green on the model. Next, paint all of the brass sections with a metallic paint. Once that paint dries, go over the brass sections with a dry brush using very light, diluted brown paint to give the model a grimy feel. Then use the same technique to wash over the brass sections with a coat of light grey. For the silver sections of the model, start with a base coat of silver and then add various light washes of black and brown. Use a dark brown for Big Daddy's boots and gloves. Then, paint the portholes white, and after they dry, add some orange and yellow washes to give a glowing appearance. Finally, add the finishing touch to your Big Daddy model by painting the tank valve on the
